NEW GRANTS & PROGRAMS

■ Aetna Foundation (Harford, CT) awarded more than \$1.2 million in grants to 23 organizations nationwide to address the use of digital health technology to support minorities and other vulnerable populations. Funding is part of the foundation's three-year, \$4 million commitment aimed at enlisting technology to address public health issues. Grant recipients include 23 organizations, such as health centers, hospitals, and other community-based organizations, that will focus on applying existing technology to improve health and health care. Funded organizations must use evidence-based approaches in carrying out work associated with their funded project. For more information, visit www.aetna.com/foundation.

Center for Health Program Management (Sacramento, CA) and funding partners Sierra Health Foundation (Sacramento, CA), The California Endowment (Los Angeles), and The California Wellness Foundation (Woodland Hills) announced that \$1.6 million in grant funding has been awarded to four California counties to implement an innovative approach to juvenile justice reform known as the Positive Youth Justice Initiative. Alameda County Probation Department (Hayward), San Diego County Probation Department, San Joaquin County Probation Department (Stockton), and Vallejo City Unified School District in Solano County were each awarded \$400,000 for a two-year period to test a series of reforms designed to transform juvenile justice into a more effective system and improve the lives of the youth they engage across California. Sierra Health Foundation, through the Center for Health Program Management, launched the initiative in 2012 to transform juvenile justice in California by treating the root issues affecting youth in the system. Based on Sierra's experience and compelling new child and youth development research, the initiative was developed as a comprehensive, datadriven approach that combines proven practice models and targets the highest risk youth. improve maternal and child health; Children's Crisis Treatment Center (Philadelphia) – \$60,000 over two years in support of expanding trauma-focused behavioral health services for children who have experienced abuse into Montgomery County; Latina Community Health Services at Pennsylvania Hospital (Philadelphia) – \$193,400 over two years to support prenatal care to Latina women who are uninsured and ineligible to receive Medicaid benefits; and Phoenixville Health Care Access – \$20,000 for dental care for uninsured and underinsured children and adults through a community provider network model. ■ Healthcare Georgia Foundation (Atlanta) announced the launch of its new infant mortality program initiative Taking Care of You. The initiative is consistent with the foundation's mission to improve the health of all Georgians and to expand access to affordable quality health care services for underserved individuals and communities. Building on a previous investment, this initiative will provide multiyear community-level funding, technical support, and evaluation assistance for the purpose of achieving measureable reductions in adverse birth outcomes among high disparity populations, including, but not limited to, low-birth weight, prematurity, and sudden unexpected infant death/sudden infant death syndrome. Recipients of the three-year, \$450,000 grants include: Clayton County Board of Health for the Every Woman, Every Time Program; Lowndes County Board of Health for the Lowndes Unique Victories Program; and Southwest Public Health District for the Centering Pregnancy Model of **Care**. In addition, the following grants were awarded as part of the initiative: **Emory University School of Medicine** - a three-year award to conduct a crosssite evaluation of the Taking Care of You initiative, and Porter Novelli three-year support for a social marketing and outreach and education Taking Care of You campaign. ■ The Health Foundation of Greater Indianapolis (IN) awarded three grants totaling \$440,376 to provide state residents with greater access to navigation assistance for the health insurance marketplace. A grant of \$270,000 was awarded to Indiana 2-1-1 (Indianapolis) to maintain detailed information about navigators and certified application counselors and to reach more than 150,000 callers to the 2-1-1 networks through May 2014 with health care options information and provide prescreening and referrals. Indiana Primary Health Care Association (Indianapolis) received a \$70,376 grant to train 26 additional certified Indiana navigators in 21 health centers across the state and to provide continuing education to a minimum of 126 state-certified navigators in state funded and federally qualified health centers. Eskenazi Health (Indianapolis) was awarded \$100,000 to extend its media and outreach campaign through the end of the first open enrollment period in March 2014. The campaign promotes Eskenazi Health's toll-free ACA Navigator Call Center, which answers consumer questions and provides assistance in obtaining health insurance through the health insurance marketplace. Obici Healthcare Foundation (Suffolk, VA) awarded more than \$5 million to 48 organizations in Virginia's Tidewater Region for its 2014 fiscal year. Among the grantees are: Senior Services of Southeastern Virginia (Norfolk) - \$500,000 to rehabilitate the historical Hayden High School in Franklin, Virginia, and provide intergenerational health and wellness services to the community; Peninsula Institute for Community Health (Newport News) - \$250,000 to provide access to clinical intervention/ primary care services for the diagnosis and management of diabetes and oral health; Sentara Louise Obici Memorial Hospital (Suffolk) – \$102,962 for a hospital-based, universal risk screening during pregnancy or at birth that connects new parents with appropriate community resources; Eastern Virginia Medical School (Norfolk, VA) -\$85,748 to reduce the risk of diabetes by

educating physicians, conducting screenings, and implementing a telephonic care management plan for referred patients; **Horizon Health Services, Inc.** (Waverly) – \$75,000 to provide dental care and smoking cessation services in Franklin, Southampton, Surry, and Sussex service areas; and **Isle of Wight Department of Social Services** – \$73,107 for a proactive outreach program to increase the number of children and families enrolled in Medicaid and FAMIS in Isle of Wight County. ■ Patient-Centered Outcomes Research Institute (PCORI)

(Washington, DC) announced intended funding to support research focused on determining which obesity treatment options delivered in primary care settings achieve the best weight loss results in people at risk for health disparities. PCORI will invest as much as \$20 million to fund up to two large trials of how well multicomponent lifestyle interventions work in treating obesity in adults age 20 and older. These interventions include dietary counseling, increased physical activity, and behavioral therapy to help individuals stick to their healthy lifestyle changes. Because obesity disproportionately affects racial and ethnic minorities, people who live in rural areas, and low-income individuals, PCORI specifically requires proposals submitted in response to this funding announcement to focus on these populations. ■ Pottstown Area Health & Wellness Foundation (PA) has awarded \$1.3 million in grant requests to 30 nonprofit organizations, schools, and municipalities. Funding was made in three priority areas: healthy behaviors, physical and emotional health, and strengthening

nonprofits. Sixteen organizations received funding totaling \$959,500 under the foundation's healthy behaviors priority. The Boyertown Area YMCA will use funding to support its Sports & Wellness Training Center, while the **Borough of** Pottstown will apply its grant toward the Walk & Bike Pottstown Project. In addition, two organizations received capacity building grants and one grantee received funding for capital improvements under the foundation's strengthening nonprofits priority. ■ Richmond Memorial Foundation

(VA) awarded more than \$1.4 million to 16 nonprofit organizations to improve health care in Richmond and central Virginia. A \$225,000, 18-month grant to Capital Area Health Network will support the development and implementation of a nurse advice line to serve its patients and those of other area safety net providers by providing health triage to increase patient compliance with established treatment plans, provide patients with information for at-home remedies when appropriate, and make referrals to appropriate care settings for health problems requiring medical treatment. CrossOver Healthcare Ministry was awarded \$150,000 over two years to plan, purchase, and implement an electronic health record system. Fan Free Clinic will use a \$100,000, one-year grant to improve the quality of health care provided to low-income, uninsured individuals through the integration of its behavioral, public health, and transgender health services. Better Housing **Coalition** was awarded a one-year, \$50,000 grant to provide low-income senior residents living in its facilities with access to appropriate physical and emotional support thereby enabling residents to age in place. ■ Riverside Community Health Foundation (RCHF) (California) invested over \$2.4 million into the Riverside community through its programs and grants in 2013. The impact of the foundation's 2013 grants, which totaled over \$1.2 million, will be felt at some of the largest medical centers that serve Riverside residents. Parkview Community Hospital received \$173,500 to install a new nurse call

system that will provide reliable communication for patients and nurses, and an additional \$100,000 for a new surgical microscope that will be used in delicate procedures. Riverside County Regional Medical Center Foundation was awarded \$169,312 to provide infusion PC devices and pump modules for intravenous therapy use at the Emergency Department and Same Day Surgery Department at the Riverside County Regional Medical Center. RCHF also invested another \$1.2 million into the community through its health education and prevention programs, including \$200,000 toward the Miles of Smiles program, which provides access to dental education, screenings, and sealants and serves 25,000 children a year. Enterprise Community Partners, Inc. will apply funding to support its **Housing First** initiative, which is reducing chronic adult homelessness and evaluating pilot programs to reduce youth homelessness. Funding to Volunteers of America of Greater **Ohio** will help the organization provide services to young men experiencing homelessness, including developing a plan for emergency sheltering of young men.
