

Congressional Budget Office Estimated Costs of Medicaid Expansion, 2014-2022 (Dollar Figures Assume All States Take the Expansion)



Medicaid Expansion Will Raise State Medicaid Spending by Modest 2.8 Percent


9-Year Total State Medicaid Spending Funded by State Dollars, 2014-2022

Average Annual State Medicaid Spending Funded by State Dollars, Over 2014-2022 Period




- States' Spending on Medicaid and CHIP Without Health Reform, 2014-2022


Arkansas Estimates Medicaid Expansion Will Save State \$358 Million Over 2014-2025





The Graph Used to Argue that State Spending on Medicaid now Surpasses K-12 Education


(The Presentation that Counts Federally-funded Medicaid Costs As State Spending)

Added Costs if All States Take the Medicaid Expansion


Well Under \$5 billion
