

A Profile of Foundations Created from Health Care Conversions

Since 1996 Grantmakers In Health (GIH) has tracked and reported on the emergence and activities of health foundations formed from transactions involving hospitals, health plans, or health systems. GIH's biannual survey of foundations created from health care conversions collects basic information regarding the year of transaction, geographic location, assets, tax status, and focus of grantmaking.

This report is the tenth in the GIH series. It provides a timely profile of foundations formed from health care conversions for grantmakers and others interested in these organizations.

SURVEY METHODOLOGY

In this year's survey, GIH identified 197 health foundations created in the wake of transactions involving the sale, merger, or transfer of assets of nonprofit health organizations. We used Surveymonkey to administer the survey over a six-week period from March 2 - April 10, 2009. Additional information was obtained via telephone, e-mail, and the Internet. Of the foundations surveyed, 155 (79 percent) responded.

Please note that the foundations surveyed this year include funders appearing in previous reports, as well as those surveyed for the first time. Some of these first-time respondents are brand new, while others have been in existence for some time but have only recently come to our attention. Given these different types of respondents, care must be taken in making comparisons between results from our earlier reports and this report.

PROFILE IN BRIEF

Beginning in the 1980s, a number of new foundations created through health care conversions joined the field of health philanthropy. GIH has identified almost 200 foundations that were either newly formed with the assets from a health care conversion or received assets generated by a conversion. The conversion phenomenon continues, although at a slower pace since the mid-1990s. In fact, of the foundations that responded to this year's survey, fewer than one-quarter were created after 2000.

GIH conducted the 2009 survey during a period when the United States was experiencing its most severe economic crisis since the Great Depression. In February

2009 the stock market hit its lowest level in 12 years. Like the rest of the economy, foundations are feeling the squeeze: fewer resources coupled with the increased needs of individuals, families, and communities. Health foundations face serious challenges as they tighten operating budgets and try to maintain support for grantees. They continue, however, to bring significant resources to the tasks of improving health and health care in their priority areas.

As the impact of the economic crisis continues to unfold, this report presents a snapshot in time of foundations created from health care conversions. The foundation assets contained within this report are as of December 31, 2008, unless otherwise noted. Reported assets range from approximately \$2.4 million to \$3.5 billion.

While foundations created from health care conversions differ a great deal from one another, they do have some similarities in their approach to grantmaking. By and large, they fund within limited geographic areas. And although their priorities and program areas reflect diverse interests, almost all of these foundations make grants to address the health needs of their communities. The majority of foundations profiled in this report focus their grantmaking exclusively on health and health care. Commonly funded areas include health promotion and disease prevention, access to care, behavioral health, public health, and building the capacity of nonprofit organizations. Some foundations focus on specific populations - children, elderly, communities of color, or immigrants – while others concentrate on broader health issues. A small number of foundations spend the bulk of their grant dollars in health but also fund in areas such as human services, education, and community and economic development.
